When the RBRVS was instituted, it created a huge payment disparity for anesthesia care, mostly due to significant undervaluation of anesthesia work compared to other physician services. Today, more than a decade since the RBRVS took effect, Medicare payment for anesthesia services stands at just \$16.19 per unit. This amount does not cover the cost of caring for our nation's seniors, and is creating an unsustainable system in which anesthesiologists are being forced away from areas with disproportionately high Medicare populations.

In an effort to rectify this untenable situation, the RUC recommended that CMS increase the anesthesia conversion factor to offset a calculated 32 percent work undervaluation, a move that would result in an increase of nearly \$4.00 per anesthesia unit and serve as a major step forward in correcting the long-standing undervaluation of anesthesia services. An analysis of our payer mix reveals that nearly half of our patient population is covered by governmental payers. Because of the steady decline in the conversion factor over the years, we have seen a direct and negative impact on our ability to offer a competitive salary and benefit package to prospective candidates. This places my group at a significant disadvantage and inhibits my ability to provide the access to the kind of high quality care we wish to provide to our patients. Dear Ms. Norwalk:

I have just completed my residency training in Anesthesia. Anesthesia is a demanding and stressful medical specialty with often long and odd hours. My practice is extremely rewarding on a personal level. I often spend more time with an individual patient over the course of a procedure than that patient may spend with their primary care doctor over the course of many years. I take pride in the quality and safety of the life saving services that I provide to my patients and do my best to make sure they have a safe and painless recovery.

I would like to say that health care in the US is truly an open market place and that physicians will gravitate to areas where reimbursement is highest. Today hospitals must compete with ambulatory surgical centers for a limited number of highly trained anesthesiologists. Ambulatory surgical centers offer anesthesiologists healthier, low-risk patients, reasonable hours and patients who have insurance that pays actual market prices for anesthesia services. Ambulatory surgical centers will continue to have an anesthesia recruitment advantage. If this continues it will lead to a shortage of anesthesiologists willing to take care of elderly and often gravely ill medicare patients who frequently need emergency surgery at all hours of the night.

I would also like to add that the profession of anesthesia has been at the forefront of driving quality and cost effectiveness in American health care. The death rate from general anesthesia has dropped from 1 in 10,000 in 1980 to less than 1 in 250,000 today. With newer anesthetic techniques such as fast-track extubation after cardiac surgery, regional nerve blocks for pain control and epidurals for post operative pain management patients are able to leave the hospital sooner and recover faster. These advances are saving medicare billions of dollars in reduced hospital stays and benefiting our patients in ways that can't be measured.

If CMS is not able to adequately compensate for these procedures which my colleagues and I have spent the bulk of our adult lives learning and perfecting then the future of Anesthesia in the US will be obvious. Anesthesia providers will go to ambulatory surgical centers and private hospitals. Please recognize the value of our services and the benefits that we bring to America's disabled and senior citizens and compensate us accordingly.

You can help our profession by considering the following: When the RBRVS was instituted, it created a huge payment disparity for anesthesia care, mostly due to significant undervaluation of anesthesia work compared to other physician services. Today, more than a decade since the RBRVS took effect, Medicare payment for anesthesia services stands at just \$16.19 per unit. This amount does not cover the cost of caring for our nation s seniors, and is creating an unsustainable system in which anesthesiologists are being forced away from areas with disproportionately high Medicare populations.

I encourage CMS to implement the RUC recommended increases in anesthesia work values. This adjustment is long overdue and its justification has been demonstrated more thoroughly and more frequently than virtually any fee schedule issue considered by the agency.

The recommended increase is large but I would point out that even with the fully implemented work value adjustment the resulting national average Medicare anesthesia conversion factor will still be less than 40% of the prevailing commercial rate. Surely, the increase for 2008 is a significant step in the right direction, but anesthesiologists caring for large numbers of Medicare beneficiaries will remain seriously disadvantaged relative to their peers in "younger" communities. This ongoing discrepancy deserves serious attention from CMS.

With this background, the adoption of the proposed adjustment is critical and absolutely necessary.
