Gentlemen:

I do not understand how Medicaid became involved with transporting students to school. Students, whether they are with or without disabilities, attend school to learn. They do not attend school to receive medical treatment and if the Speech Teacher does pull them out once a week for an hour, that is not a medical service. I am a retired high school teacher, and for the last 11 years that I taught, there was never a nurse on campus unless it was a specific scheduled visit, such as mass Vision Screening, or when there was an emergency. In those instances, the one nurse in the district (total 10+ schools), would drive to the school and render a specific service. All bandages, cold packs and basic first aid items were handled by school secretaries/clerks.

If a specific disabled child needed particular on-going health services, they were performed by the adult aide assigned to that student, not by an on-campus nurse. These services were all spelled out in advance in the student's Individual Education Plan, and were not medical services, but simply an intervention to enable the student to function as a student.

Education is supposed to be the function of the local school district, funded by property taxes. In spite of NCLB trying to force higher academic standards on schools, Education is still the responsibility of the school board and county.

No wonder Medicaid doesn't have enough money. Please stop using federal taxpayers' money to pay for transportation that should be funded at the local level. What a waste to send money to Washington, supposedly for Defense and other federal mandates, and then it is sent back to the local schools to pay for bus services.

If this is a situation where the federal government has tried to buy influence in local schools, by providing transportation services, then they should get out. The federal government has proven it cannot run very many things well and it tends to squander money. I write this letter on behalf of the estimated 9 million children in America who are without health insurance and whose families struggle to earn enough money for food and shelter.

The health-insurance program, the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP), which applies to some 6 million children who otherwise would not have coverage, is due to expire on September 30, 2007. It is crucial that the President agree to both extend and expand this program.

The president has proposed \$4.8 billion in new SCHIP funding over a five year period. However, the Congressional Budget Office projects that funding at that level would result in no new coverage. In fact, the Georgetown University Center for Children and Families has determined such an appropriation would result in the loss of SCHIP coverage for more than 1 million children.

The President's current plan could underfund the program by an estimated \$9-billion according to analysis by the Congressional Budget Office. This proposed appropriation is inadequate and comes at a time when a major expansion of a children's health program is necessary.

The compromise legislation on the reauthorization of the State Children's Health Insurance Program approved by Congress would secure SCHIP's future for the next 10 years. It would allow states to continue their efforts to cover more children, particularly those from the lowest income families.

Time is running short. Millions of uninsured children in America are counting on the President to do the right thing.

On behalf of the North Central Special Education Cooperative, I am writing to express our strong opposition to the proposed rule that the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released. The rule would eliminate Medicaid reimbursement for administrative and transportation costs for services provided to students with disabilities under IDEA. We urge you to direct CMS to amend the proposed rule, which would be harmful to the most vulnerable of America's school children those with disabilities who come from impoverished families.

The cooperative school districts are extremely concerned that the rule would reduce the availability of, and access to, needed health care for these students.

Federal Medicaid reimbursement for administrative services is critically important to ensure that schools are able to provide the appropriate outreach activities to link children to medical services, identify those students who may need medical screening, and provide referral services in the community.

The Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988 (P.L. 100-360) allows school districts to receive Medicaid payments for health services delivered to Medicaid-eligible children with disabilities who may need transportation for diagnostic, preventive and rehabilitative services and therapies, as well as the administrative costs of providing school-based services, such as outreach for enrollment purposes, coordination and/or monitoring of medical care. A rule to prohibit schools for claiming these expenses would contradict existing law and seriously impede the ability of states and school districts to provide these services, which are mandated under IDEA.

At a time when the federal government is only funding approximately 20 percent of the national average per pupil expenditure for each child in special education, instead of the 40 percent that Congress promised to pay when IDEA was first enacted, major cutbacks in Medicaid reimbursements will severely restrict the ability of states and local school districts to provide much-needed health care services to disabled children.

The NCSEC school districts strongly urge you to reconsider implementing this proposed administrative change and to work with states and school districts to ensure that all children receive the health services that they deserve. Without access to appropriate health care, children with disabilities will face even more challenges to making progress consistent with the President's signature domestic policy, the No Child Left Behind Act.

As Director of our Family Resource Center, much of our day is spent linking childeren and families in our school district to health services. Teachers do not have time and cannot be expected to attend to all the health needs of students and cannot effectively teach students with unmet medical needs. School Districts are in the unique position of having access to children eligible for Medicaid services and building trust with parents in order to wade through the bureaucratic maze of getting health care for their children. We live in a medically underserved area with no public transportation and with one Rural Health Center. Most diagnostic tests and specialized care are obtained an hour or more drive away. Our Medicaid eligible students have an even bigger challenge to getting care as most private providers cannot afford to accept Medicaid patients. Because of barriers such as poverty, transportation, geographical isolation and education, the coordination of Medicaid services is paramount to the health of the community.
