The Jackson Public School District is submitting this comment on the proposed rule change by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) regarding the Medicaid school-based administrative claiming (CMS-2287-P). Notice of the submitted comments will be forwarded to the Mississippi Congressional Delegation.

The Jackson Public School District (JPS) adamantly opposes the proposed CMS rule change to Medicaid school-based administrative claiming. The proposed rule change will eliminate reimbursement under the Medicaid program for the costs of school-based administrative and transportation services and limit reimbursements to only administrative services performed specifically by Medicaid employees. We anticipate several problems from the proposed rule change:

- 1. Mississippi s large population of low-income students (highest in the nation) will suffer inordinately due to the loss of Medicaid reimbursement funds, the main source of coverage for health care services to the poor. JPS alone has a student poverty rate of 82% (based on free/reduced lunch eligibility).
- 2. The loss of Medicaid funds as a result of the proposed rule change will not be offset by any other source. There are no plans to offset the loss through IDEA, which is already underfunded, and state and local revenue sources are likewise overtaxed.
- 3. The proposed rule change will be cutting funds to more than 90 school districts in Mississippi that participate in the program. JPS is the largest and only urban school district in the state, placing it in a unique position to provide Medicaid reimbursable services to a large group of at-risk students whose needs would otherwise go unaddressed.
- 4. It has been estimated that the proposed rule change will cost Mississippi schools between \$4 5 million each year in Medicaid reimbursements. The Jackson Public School District will lose more than \$313,000 dollars each year from an already insufficient student services budget.

While JPS acknowledges the concerns of CMS regarding the inconsistent application of Medicaid requirements by school districts, there seem to be far less drastic avenues for addressing these and other concerns. For example, in Mississippi the School Based Administrative Claiming Program is housed in the Mississippi Department of Education, which provides training and technical support for processing claims. This allows for the improvement and standardization of claims while still offering the opportunity to receive funding that will assist with providing services to children that are greatly needed. If the problem is that states are billing improperly, CMS should provide training, monitoring, and auditing to ensure proper billing policies are followed rather than eliminate the program. In addition, the proposed rule change appears to have a conflict with current law. Title XIX Section 1903 (c) of the Social Security Act forbids the Secretary of Health & Human Services to deny reimbursement for claims related to eligible services for children and students with disabilities. School-based claiming was also legally protected in the 1987 Bowen case, when the appellate court ruled that school-based claims were reimbursable, and the Supreme Court elected to let that decision stand.

For these reasons, the Jackson Public School District states for the record its opposition to the CMS proposed rule change for the Medicaid school-based administrative claiming. The proposed rule change does not equitably address the concerns of improper billing by school districts, improper allocation to Medicaid, or the dramatic increase in Medicaid claims for school-based costs. The proposed change will result in a loss of necessary revenue without means for replacement. The rule change is unsound policy in light of current law and court precedent. And the proposed rule change fails the standard that all government policies should be judged by -- what improvement will be gained by the citizens of the nation and states.

As the school nurse in a rural district who is also our Medical ACCESS coordinator, I am very concerned about the proposal of eliminating school reimbursement for administrative duties and special transportation services for our children with special needs. The school is required to provide these services (and we are happy to), but where do the budget cuts end! Each year, any type of additional services that our students receive cost the district more and more money and it seems that we have more children that have IEP's and who qualify for these services which we must provide. I spend many hours each week working on referring students to apply for ACCESS cards, assisting where I can help them out, then having them tested by the appropriate individuals and referring them for appropriate services. Then having an IEP meeting for these students, having a medical practitioner authorize the need for these services, then getting parent signature for approval to bill MA, then entering all of this billing info each month on the computer for reimbursement. This is just one tiny part of my school nurse job, but it takes hours to do because of the administrative duties involved. As with anything there is a lof of extra time and paperwork involved with this process. I don't know how the rest of the country works, but here in our school system, children succeed in life because of the special help they get from the school staff, not from an employee of DHHR. It is ludicrous to cut school funding for children and push 'No Child Left Behind'. The funding Medicaid supplies to schools is what PREVENTS children from getting left behind. If there is a problem with accountability for funds, audit individual school systems. Don't punish those who are abiding by the law.

Whereas, this action would reduce the availability of and access to needed health and developmental services for students with Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and other low-income children with special needs, for whom school is their primary site for healthcare delivery, and

Whereas, schools rely on these reimbursements for a variety of purposes such as transporting children to school for their medical appointments, identifying students who need health related screenings and evaluations, connecting children and their families with other needed health services in their community, and coordinating and monitoring those health services with which they have been connected, and

Whereas, the loss of these resources could mean that schools have to curtail their health-related referral services, and/or scale back health-related outreach activities, and

Whereas, many of these identified health services are mandated under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) law, therefore this action would substantially increase the burden on already financially-strapped local school districts and, as a result, could impact students in regular education programs as well through cuts to electives, after school activities, arts and music programs, and/or reductions in teachers and support positions.
