I am opposed to CMS-2287-P. I believe it is a bad policy, and could result in increased costs through missed opportunities for kids to be covered by health insurance and for kids to be connected to services they need before health issues become catastrophic.

Further, contrary to CMS statement that school-based MAA is not necessary for the proper and efficient administration of the State plan, today s schools and their staff are the primary source of information and referral for families on a wide range of services including those covered by the Medicaid program. Parents trust and depend on school staff for information on everything from housing to food to health services and since virtually all children attend school it is absolutely a proper and efficient system to utilize.

In their proposed rule, CMS tries to make the case that all activities and services performed by school district staff simply support educational programs, overlap with educational programs, or are required by IDEA, and therefore don't directly or specifically benefit the Medicaid program. In fact, we know that every day school staff assists students in extraordinary ways that go above and beyond educational programs.

In the area of specialized transportation, CMS justifies this cut by saying that students receive transportation from home to school and back regardless of whether or not they are determined eligible for special education services. Therefore, they say, specialized transportation services should not be reimbursable through the LEA program. Of course, what CMS is ignoring is that the cost of providing specialized transportation either in a wheel chair accessible vehicle or litter van is significantly more expensive than transportation provided to regular education students.
